Dear parents and guardians,

Monday 8 February 2021 will be a new milestone for all of us, but especially for your child(ren). Then they are allowed to go back to class, finally after more than six weeks of lock-down. There will be room for them to chat with friends, they can learn and laugh together again!

For almost a year now, the schools have been switching from physical to online education and back again with you and your child(ren). In any case, our schools do everything they can to stay connected to you as much as possible, both off- and online. As the board of Aves, we are pleased that the school doors are allowed to open again. In any case, we have confidence in the government's decision and the RIVM. As always, we follow the advice and protocols they issue.

With this letter we will inform you about the most important changes and developments that the reopening of the schools will entail. You may have already read this in the media. The director of your child's school will inform you about the implementation of the measures at your own school.



Infections at school/more often classes at home

One of the strict measures associated with the reopening is to a faster transition to quarantine for a whole group of students in case of infection. If one of the students in the group is infected, the entire group (including teacher) will be quarantined. Testing can take place after 5 days. If the results are negative (no corona), the students can go back to school. Another option is 10 days in quarantine. In this case, there is no need for a test. In this situation, distance learning comes into the picture for your child (ren).

It is also possible that schools will have to send a class home in the coming period for reasons other than quarantine. Because a number of our teachers belong to the risk group, the pressure on the substitute pool is greater than usual. This may result in insufficient teacher availability at times. We understand that this could mean a significant impact on your own situation because you can receive a message from school that your child(ren) should stay home the next day. In that case, you must arrange for childcare yourself at short notice.

Emergency childcare

We no longer provide any emergency childcare, not even if a group has to be quarantined.

Limit contact and travel movements

At the reopening of the schools, the classes remain separate from each other during the day. This is also the case during breaks. In this way, we shape cohortation.

In this way mutual contact remains limited. During school hours this can have consequences for:

- school start and end times and breaks (limitation of travel movements)
- flow in and around school
- and, where appropriate, the composition of groups.

Testing and vaccination

Parents have questions about testing and vaccinating children. We can be clear about this : it is your responsibility as a parent and as a guardian to decide on testing and vaccinating your child(ren).



Complaints, distance and hygiene

A number of things that were already in place at school before the lock-down, are still in force today. We mention them again:

- *Stay at home with symptoms, matching the coronavirus*
That applies to everyone in school. If your son or daughter only has a nasal cold and has no corona-related complaints, he or she can and may go to school as usual.
- *1.5 metres distance*
Teachers and educational support staff keep 1.5 metres distance. A teacher does not have to keep a distance from students, and neither do students themselves.
- *All known hygiene and ventilation measures remain important!*
Sneeze in your elbow and wash your hands. They remain important.
- *Only education at school*
After school, all pupils go home immediately.
- *For students in grades 7 and 8, a mouth nose mask is an option.*
Wearing a face mask is desirable if the pupils move through the school and cannot keep their distance from other groups. The mask can be taken off when students are at their desk.

The coming period will undoubtedly require some flexibility from you, your child(ren) and the schools. Each school is doing everything it can to resume this new phase as well as possible.

Richtlijnen basisonderwijs vanaf 8 februari

Op 8 februari gaan de basisscholen weer open. Vanaf dan gelden de volgende richtlijnen:

Brengen & halen



- Kinderen van groep 7 en 8 komen zoveel mogelijk zelf naar school.
- 1 ouder/verzorger mag kinderen t/m groep 6 brengen en halen. Zij blijven buiten de school, houden 1,5 meter afstand. Advies is om een mondkapje te dragen.
- Gespreide begin- en eindtijden en pauzes.
- Na schooltijd: iedereen direct naar huis.

Afstand & groepjes



- Onderwijspersoneel houdt zoals altijd 1,5 meter afstand tot elkaar.
- Zoveel mogelijk vaste groepen leerlingen.
- Buitenspelen alleen met de eigen klas.

Mondkapjes



- Onderwijspersoneel van groep 7 en 8 kan een mondkapje of spatscherm dragen (niet verplicht).
- Leerlingen van groep 7 en 8 dragen een mondkapje in de gangen als de vaste groep geen afstand kan houden van andere leerlingen..

Quarantaine



- Onderwijspersoneel en leerlingen die in nauw contact zijn geweest met iemand die besmet is met het coronavirus: 5 dagen thuis in quarantaine.
- Daarna: testen bij de GGD of 5 dagen langer thuis in quarantaine.
